Biodiversity Plan Updated November 2022



1. Introduction

Community & Town Councils are required under the Environment Wales Act 2016 Section 6 to prepare and publish a plan setting out what they propose to do to comply with the duty to Maintain and Enhance Biodiversity within their current work areas.

Public authorities must seek to maintain and enhance biodiversity in the exercise of functions in relation to Wales, and in so doing promote the resilience of ecosystems, so far as consistent with the proper exercise of those functions.

This plan demonstrates Llanwrthwl Community Council's commitment to and responsibility for complying with the duty.

2. Llanwrthwl

Llanwrthwl Community Council covers a vast area of, mainly upland, Mid Wales in the Cambrian Mountains. It comprises of 7,795.92 hectares¹ with a population of approximately 191. This equates to a population density of 0.02 persons per hectare.

Part of the National Trust's large Abergwesyn Common (6523.02 ha total) lies within the Community Council area. Llanwrthwl village is situated on the River Elan close to its confluence with the River Wye. The Wye passes through the Community Council area as does part of the Wye Valley walk. The river Wye is designated as a SAC and SSSI along its entire length.

Community facilities include Llanwrthwl Village Hall, (run by an independent Management Committee), Penuel Congregational Chapel and St Gwrthwl's Church.

3. Wildlife and Biodiversity

Most of the Community Council area lies within National Landscape Character Area (NLCA) 21, Cambrian Mountains. The open moorlands are home to some important bird species including Red Grouse Lapwing, Golden Plover and Red Kite.

A small section of the area sits within NLCA26, the Upper Wye Valley. Varied riparian habitats and sessile oak woodlands characterise this part of the Community Council area.

The upper reaches of the Wye are home to a diverse range of flora and fauna including specialties such as otter and red kite.

4. Audit of Functions – What we do now

The Community Council does not own or manage any land. It holds the Trust of the Village Hall which is managed by an independent Management Committee. The Community Council takes an active interest in the Powys Countryside Volunteers initiative run by Powys County Council and involved in creating and maintaining rights of way in the County.

The Community Council makes an annual contribution to the running of the Village Hall and an annual donation to the Church and Chapel.
